Dealing with Difficult People During the Pandemic— Through the Lens of the Provincial Security Office.” (10 AM)

The COVID pandemic has brought new and interesting security challenges particularly for high profile individuals in the public eye.

Join Glen Morrison as he shares information on the Provincial Security and Intelligence Office and lessons learned over the past months in response to the pandemic and issues revolving around complex clients and their impact.



Glen Morrison, CPP has been with the Government of Alberta since 2014 as a security advisor, Operations Manager and more recently as the Acting Director of the Provincial Security and Intelligence Office.

Prior to joining the Government of Alberta, Glen was with the Military Police for 26 years, working with the National Investigation Section and The National Counter-Intelligence Unit as the Detachment commander for Western Canada . During his time with the Military Police, Glen deployed to Bosnia, twice to Afghanistan as a Counter intelligence officer; Tripoli, Libya as a task Force Commander and recently took a leave of absence and deployed to Baghdad Iraq with NATO to screen and vet Iraqi trainees as a counter intelligence staff officer.

Human Trafficking Awareness (11AM)

Human trafficking is happening in communities across Canada. Understanding the facts about human trafficking, who is at risk, how traffickers recruit and exploit victims, and what signs to look for is a major step in helping to fight this widespread and often invisible crime.


Constable Kristin Appleton has 18 years of service with the RCMP and is currently with the Missing Person Unit in Edmonton, Alberta. Kristin is a subject matter resource for the RCMP on human trafficking investigations. She is a member of the International Association of Human Trafficking Investigators and in September 2017, she was selected to represent the RCMP in Italy to be a part of a live human trafficking simulation exercise with police officers from around the world.



Jessica Brandon has 15 years of advocacy experience with a strong focus on Human Rights. She began as a volunteer with the Action Coalition on Human Trafficking (ACT) 6 years ago and took the leap from her corporate role in the tech sector to manage the Education Program at ACT Alberta in 2018. 
